

On the August 9 referendum, vote **YES** to support Kenosha Police and Fire



If the referendum is approved, the owner of a \$200,000 home would pay approximately \$5.50 per month – less than many people spend on a take-out coffee in a day.

WHAT:
On August 9, a referendum asks the citizens of Kenosha to support the addition of 10 police officers, 6 firefighters and related equipment.

HOW: Approval of the referendum is needed in order to increase the tax levy beyond its state mandated limit by \$2.5 million for additional police and fire protection services.
